## LARTA event creates a Marylebone souk...

LATE April heralds the season of Islamic auctions in London and some specialist dealers have sensibly capitalised on the resulting influx of buyers to the capital by starting The London Antique Rug & Textile Art Fair (LARTA) three years ago.

This small event of 11 dealers is that rare thing, a British fair devoted to rugs and textiles, and it runs this year from April 19-21 at The Showroom in Penfold Street – a 'Marylebone souk' just off Church Street, itself an enclave of antiques dealers.

All things woven are on display, from Europe. Africa and across Asia and dating from all periods up to the 20th century.

Prices range from a few hundred pounds to over £45,000, although many pieces are at the more affordable end of the spectrum, from decorative textile fragments priced in the low hundreds of pounds through kelims pitched at around f600-2000 to some of the more recently produced traditional rugs priced in the low thousands.

There are three new exhibitors: Gallery Nomad from Berkhamsted; Galerie Arabesque from Stuttgart who will bring Eastern sculpture and ceramics alongside textiles; and third-generation London dealer Alex Zadah of Carltone Ltd, with textiles and early carpets.

Joss Graham, one of the founding exhibitors of LARTA, will also return after missing last year, bringing Indian works and flatweave textiles and rugs.

Marcus Voigt Textiles (London), Owen Parry (Wales), Anthony **Hazledine Oriental Carpets** (Cotswolds), Andy Lloyd (Bath) and Aaron Nejad (London) are among the regular dealers.

There is also an invitation-only preview evening on April 18 (tickets available on request via the LARTA website) and a book signing on Saturday April 20 from 4-7pm with Robert Chenciner, author of numerous books on the textiles and cultures of the Caucasus including his latest, Dragons, Padlocks and Tamerlane's Balls, an autobiography that draws in art and cultural history.

## ...and more textiles on show in the West End

THIS column seems to be taking on a bit of a textiles theme this week.

While LARTA gets under way in Marylebone (see story **above**), **The** Fleming Collection in Mayfair continue their tapestry exhibition, called Findina the Unicorn – Tapestries Mythical and Modern, from April 17 to June 1.

The show is based around seven tapestries recreating the Hunt of the Unicorn (1495-1505) series, that are now in the Cloisters Museum in New York but originally hung in Stirling Castle. These have been woven by the West Dean Tapestry Studio as part of the £12m refurbishment of the 16th century royal apartments at Stirling Castle in Scotland

This daunting project is now nearing completion after 12 years and one of the tapestries. The Unicorn is Found, woven over three and a half years by three West Dean weavers, Caron Penney, Katharine Swailes and Jo Howard, is the centrepiece of the show

It also includes the design for the last tapestry in the series, a tapestry by Henry Moore, an installation illustrating how a Tracey Emin painting was translated into tapestry and other work by West Dean tapestry studio which will be for sale (see picture above right).

will celebrate 25 years of dealing in and creating rug designs with an exhibition called Editions: Contemporary Rugs for Collectors from May 2 to June 30 in the Great Arch Hall

For this show, Christopher has collaborated with designers and artists and their estates to produce limited edition rugs from original paintings and textile designs by the likes of William Scott (1913-89), Terry Frost (1915-2003) and Sandra Blow (1925-2006).
